These two pictures show you what is left of the old walled garden and orchard areas. The orchards are now very overgrown.






#### Glasshouses

The Deramore Oak was one of the largest trees in Ireland. It was also hundreds of years old. It was very famous. When Thomas Bateson became a lord, he had to choose a name for himself, so he called himself "Lord Deramore" after the oak.








#### The Ice House

In the 1700s and 1800s people did not have fridges so they had to think of different ways of storing food. The rich families like the ones at Belvoir built ice houses which became very fashionable. There was no electricity and no way of freezing water to make ice unless it happened naturally so the ice houses were designed to keep river ice frozen for long periods. The temperature is lower underground so they stored the ice underground and covered the ice house with earth. In Belvoir, when the River Lagan froze, the head gardener and his staff went down to the river and lifted the ice. They took it to the ice house, put it in the store and then blocked the entrance tunnel with straw.
