1958	Canal and respective companies abandoned, control taken over by Department of Agriculture with it later passing to Department of Culture Arts and Leisure
♦ 1960s	960s M1 Motorway is constructed destroying central section of canal between Sprucefield and Moria
1967	Lagan Valley Regional Park is founded by John Gilchrist
⋄ Today	Today towpath and canal are used by the general public with over 500,000 visitors each year for leisure
