Activity: Nature art attack



Learning objectives

- Exploring the natural world.
- Using both natural and manmade objects.
- Investigating the work of other artists.





Teacher Preparation

Site visit & risk assessment

Equipment & Resources

Digital cameras

This is a fantastic activity for pupils to do as part of a discovery/nature walk or as an exercise within the school grounds. It is very like the work that can be viewed on the television program 'art attack'.

Main activity

- Split children into groups.
- Explain that the forest floor or meadow is going to be a canvas and anything they find will make the art.
- Tell each group to choose something to 'draw' using only materials they find around them, e.g. a tree, a flower, the river from a bird's eye view...
- 4. When complete, discuss:
 - How the art looks?
 - What worked well?
 - What didn't work?
 - · What was hard?
 - What they liked about it?
 - Compare and contrast each group.
- 6. Record the work with a camera.

Safety points

Site visit and risk assessments are essential for this activity. Ensure that the chosen area is free from hazards. Take great care when near water.
