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Lock Number 3



A lock is used to raise the water level in the canal. When a lighter or barge was going upstream, the lock keeper would open the lower lock gate and the lightermen would steer the boat into the lock chamber. The lower gate would be closed. The sluice gate in the top lock gate was then opened to allow the water to flow in and raise the boat up. Once the water level has reached the same level as the canal ahead, the top gates would be opened and the lighter towed out by the horses.




The Woodland


The River Lagan




From the path you can see the River Lagan. Think about what kind of animals would live in or on the river.


































In the Meadow



The Rath and Early Man


This "rath" or "hill fort" is a typical fortified farm built by early man. This rath is about 1500 years old.








The river was very important for people in the past. In the boxes below can you write or draw 4 things early man would have used the river for?
